# Call for Papers

Asian Journal of Peacebuilding (AJP) is a new peer-review journal publishing the original research on the topics of violence, conflict, and peacebuilding around the world. The aims of AJP are twofold: First, it intends to promote innovative research on issues related to peacebuilding in Asia, a region where national divisions, transitions, and developments are intertwined with new forms of threat, violence, and destruction. Second, it aims at disseminating peace studies conducted both in traditional disciplines of social sciences and the humanities and in interdisciplinary approaches at the interface of religion, culture, ecology, and gender studies. AJP welcomes papers written by scholars around the world, both within and outside the Asian region.

Exemplary topics on which AJP focuses are, but not limited to: reconciliation in divided societies (or nations); migrants and refugees; WMD developments; development and ecological destruction; historical and territorial disputes; peacemaking or mediation in intrastate conflicts; violence and transitional justice; anti-nuclear weapons (or anti-nuclear plants) movements; women in wars; democratic transition and human rights; post-conflict institutionalization; humanitarian assistance and protection.

## **Manuscript Submission Guidelines**

All papers are subject to anonymous peer review. The reviewers are selected based on their expertise in the area of the submitted paper, and they will evaluate submitted papers on the basis of creativity, quality of scholarship, and contribution to the field of research. Please follow the submission guidelines.

- 1. An article length should be between 6,000 and 10,000 words, including references, notes and abstract.
- 2. A research note should be no longer than 6,000 words in length, including references, notes and abstract.
- 3. A review essay should be between 3,000 and 4,000 words.
- 4. A book review should be between 600 and 1,000 words.
- 5. Articles and research notes must include an abstract of 200 words. It should highlight the significance of the article.
- 6. Submission should be made via e-mail to: peacejournal@snu.ac.kr
- 7. Authors should pay particular attention to the accuracy and correct presentation of references and citations. In-text references should be cited by giving the author's name, year of publication and specific page numbers after a direct quotation (Smith 1999, 8-9). A list of works cited must be inserted at the end of the paper. References should be singles-spaced but double-spaced between citations and arranged alphabetically by author's family name, and chronologically for each author. When referring more than once to the same author published the same year, identify each citation in the text as follows; (Smith 2012a; 2012b). When there are more than three authors, cite in the text as follows: (Smith et al. 1999) but list all the authors in the reference list. Examples:

Book: Galtung, Johan. 1996. Peace by Peaceful Means. London: Sage.

**Edited Book**: Haenn, Nora, and Richard R. Wilks, eds. 1983. *The Environment in Anthropology*. New York: New York University Press.

**Book chapter**: Hermann, Margaret G. 1984. "Personality and Foreign Policy Decision Making: A Study of Fifty-Three Heads of Government." In *Foreign Policy Decision Making*, eds. Donald A. Sylvan and Steve Chan. New York: Praeger, 133-152.

**Journal Article**: Roman, David, and Susanne Y. P. Choi. 2006. "Forgiveness and Transitional Justice in the Czech Republic." *Journal of Conflict Resolution* 50 (3): 339-67.

**Newspaper Article in Electronic Version**: Stolberg, Sherl Gay, and Robert Pear. 2010. "Wary Centrists Posing Challenge in Health Care Vote." *New York Times*, February 27.

- 8. Footnotes should be avoided, or at least kept to a minimum. They should be numbered consecutively throughout the text with superscript figures.
- 9. Figures and tables should be provided on separate sheets appended to the paper. All tables and figures should be numbered. Their position should be referred to in the text.
- 10. Subheadings within some sections should be used to clarify and divide the structure of the discussion. If more than one level of subheading is used, they must be clearly differentiated. Subheadings should not be numbered.
- 11. Double spaces should be used. Papers should be typed unjustified, without hyphenation except for compound words. Tab key should be used for paragraph indents. Times New Roman font is recommended. The word processing formatting features should be used to indicate bold, italic, Greek, equations, superscript and subscript characters. Carriage returns should not be used to make space between lines, paragraphs, references, etc. The running titles and footnote features of the word processing package should not be used.
